#### **CHILDRENS PROJECT**

On Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> November 2019, the Younger Generations visited the National Children's Museum in Halifax, which is called Eureka!. Eureka is an extraordinary fun packed day out, aimed at kids aged 0-11. There are 6 unique zones to discover, each filled with hundreds of interactive exhibits designed to inspire enquiring minds to find out about themselves and the world around them.

In the all about me area, the children could look up a giant nose, scan a pregnant mums' tummy and find out what they would look like a few years from now. There were machines which could measure how tall you are, how far you can reach to the side, how far you can stretch up, how ears, noses and eyes work and how our digestive system works. The children particularly liked pressing the button which made the interactive digestive system burp!

In the Spark Gallery, the children were able explore digital exhibits and interactive light shows. There was a sound space where the children could help Orby the alien test and create sounds and also discover the different properties of sounds and how to make them. In the sound garden, there was a sensory area for younger children where they could explore how precious nature is, dress up, listen to global lullabies and design and free their own butterfly.

The museum had a creativity space for little ones, filled with colourful cushions to chill out on and an area to draw and make things. There was a desert discovery area where you could stroke a coyote, turn a giant crank, build an

oasis, explore it and learn about different sounds and smells in the desert.

In the living and working together zone – the children could explore a child sized town square complete with shops and a fountain. In the square the children could role play, whilst learning all about the world of work in a Halifax Bank, an M&S, a Transco road dig area, a garage and a car wash. There was even an old train carriage in the grounds where you could eat a packed lunch. In the home area the children were able to see how items in a bathroom, such as a toilet, shower and bath work. They could experiment in the play kitchen and chill out in the bedroom and light filled dream space.

Eureka was an amazing place to visit. There was so much to see, do, discover and learn about. The children really enjoyed their visit there.





On Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> December 2019 our younger members went to see the pantomime, Aladdin at The Forum. Before the performance Lee Winter had arranged for us all to go on a touch tour of the set. Daryl took us on a touch tour, where we got to see the set, some of the props and we met

a member of the cast too. The children could then relate what they had seen close up to what they might not be able to see too clearly from the audience.

The children got to touch the Giant Genie puppet and rub his lamp. They were able to see Widow Twanky's costumes close up and touch some of her elaborate wigs. The children also got to meet the actress who played the Slave of the Ring. She was wearing a beautiful orange and gold costume and asked the children if they would like to feel the material.





After the touch tour, we took our seats in the audience and watched the pantomime. It was brilliant. It was full of jokes for the children and one or two for the grown-ups. The cast threw sweets into the audience and ran into the audience squirting super soaker water pistols. Our families really enjoyed the afternoon, it was great fun.

The trip was once again funded by Sport England for which we continue to be extremely grateful.

We have now booked and confirmed 2 residential trips to Yealand Old School, these residential trips are being organised with Vision of Adventure who are very excited to be working with us. The first trip is the 17<sup>th</sup> - 18<sup>th</sup> March and the second trip is 18<sup>th</sup> - 19<sup>th</sup> March, activities will include Kayaking, Walking and Archery with the possibility of some more activities being added in depending on the weather.

Furthermore, we are pleased to announce the Cricket Tournament is now all fully booked for the 7<sup>th</sup> June at Barrow Cricket Club, team will be of mixed abilities and everyone will play to the same set of rules. The cost of entering a team will be £25, each team will be a maximum

Natural Speech – click a button and ask for what you want, such as "read me The Guardian" or "call Sherlock Holmes"

#### A FEW WORDS FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

I first became a volunteer for Barrow & District Society for the Blind in 2008 supporting Trustee Board Meetings as an observer before formally registering as a Trustee a few years later when I decided to permanently settle in the area; laterally I have been honoured to serve as the Chair of the Trustee Board.

My dad was registered blind as a consequence of Glaucoma linked to a condition called Marfan's Syndrome. As his eyesight worsened, my dad struggled to live an independent life; struggled to get 'out and about' and lived his later years largely as a recluse. I wanted better for people like my dad and when I started in a Graduate role at BAE Systems Submarines it felt natural to volunteer with the Society.

As a Trustee my role is to work with other Trustees to ensure the charity has a clear strategy and our collective efforts are aligned to what we want to achieve. For me our collective purpose is clear – to support visually impaired people who live in our area to live an independent life.

The best part of being a Trustee is receiving feedback from our Management Team on how our staff and volunteers are supporting our clients across a diverse range of things - I am immensely proud of our staff, volunteers and clients for all they are able to do and everything they are able to achieve.

The charity has been able to do fantastic things in recent years including setting up the Young Person's Group offering activities to visually impaired children in our area, converting the Blind Shop to a Vision Support Centre allowing a more direct support service and of course the Bradbury Sight Loss and Dementia village which opened at Ostley House last year aimed at providing improved stimulus for our residents. But it is not just about those big new things; I believe something as simple as a phone call from one of our volunteers offering support can make a huge difference to our clients.

I am minded of a conversation I had with a client a few years back about the importance of our volunteers. Granted the charity needs a level of income to sustain our current services, however, people make our charity, they allow us to drive our charity forward - volunteering for just a few hours a week will help us deliver those additional services, that additional support.
